### Energy Networks Association: Open Networks

The first consultation from this ENA project focuses on <u>Commercial Principles for</u> <u>Contracted Flexibility</u>.

The paper examines how our system can maximise the use of DER assets, deliver access to markets for all parties, encourage new business models and maximise the benefits of competition and third-party involvement.

The ENA is seeking views on how to ensure that the creation of a smart electricity grid enables new markets and opportunities for distributed energy technologies and services.

#### National Grid: Open Letter

Following industry feedback National Grid has <u>published an open letter</u> to clarify the arrangements for 'Reflecting Variations in Offshore Transmission Owner (OFTO) Revenue in Offshore Local TNUoS Tariffs'.

#### Ofgem consults on proposal to issue fines to DNOs

Ofgem has published a consultation on its proposal to fine DNOs a total of £139m.

The consultation comes following Ogem's annual consultation on its 'Incentive on Connections Engagement' (ICE) – set out to encourage DNOs to provide a good level of service and engagement to customers.

DNOs submitted evidence in May this year, and <u>Scottish Renewables submitted a</u> <u>response</u>.

Stakeholders have until September 18 to provide Ofgem with further evidence to inform their final decision. Please direct any queries to <u>Hannah Smith</u>.

## Cost of Energy Review

Professor Dieter Helm has been appointed to chair <u>an independent review into the</u> <u>cost of energy</u>.

Professor Helm will be supported by an advisory panel which includes Richard Nourse, Managing Partner of Greencoat Capital and Isobel Sheldon, Engineering and Technology Director of Johnson Matthey Battery Systems.

Scottish Renewables will be working alongside other UK trade associations to ensure that the review is presented with relevant evidence on the low cost of energy

# **Barclay Review of Business Rates**

As set out in our introduction, August saw the publication of the <u>Barclay Review of</u> <u>Business Rates</u>.

A number of recommendations from <u>Scottish Renewables' evidence</u> are reflected within the report's recommendations, including:

- The introduction of three-yearly revaluations from 2022, with values based on market conditions on a date one year prior
- A proposed review of Plant and Machinery regulations, with a particular focus on renewable energy
- A recommendation to improve transparency, via a statutory body if necessary.

# Media reactions

Scottish Renewables' responded to two media stories featuring offshore renewables in August:

# **RHI Regulations**

The UK Government laid <u>new RHI legislation</u> before parliament on August 30. It will come into effect on September 20, 2017.

A number of changes have been introduced following the draft regulations laid earlier this year, including:

- Alignment of non-domestic biomass tariff and changes to load factor from 15% to 35%
- New degression triggers until July 2018
- New tariffs for domestic RHI.

# Letter to BEIS and Ofgem: Ensuring the Feed-in Tariff works as intended

<u>Scottish Renewables, along with a group of other trade associations, has written to</u> <u>BEIS and Ofgem</u> setting out our concerns over unintended consequences of Ofgem's guidance for suppliers which may impact the maintenance of FiT projects.

Current wording suggests that where certain equipment is replaced, a generator risks decommissioning the site.
