

### Dear Member,

October brought a number of policy announcements for the renewables sector.

The Scottish Government <u>committed</u> to launch a publicly-owned, renewably-powered energy company. At Westminster BEIS <u>allocated</u> funding of up to £557 million for future less-established CfD auctions and <u>confirmed that Scottish remote island</u> <u>wind projects will be able to bid in</u>.



The UK Government also published two documents: the long-awaited <u>Clean Growth</u> <u>Strategy</u>, which signalled welcome ambition for the sector but disappointingly failed to commit to deliver a route to market for onshore wind and solar, and Professor Dieter Helm's <u>independent review into the cost of energy</u>.

At Scottish Renewables we're continuing to work constructively with both governments to ensure renewables are central to the delivery of their respective policy ambitions.

## Party Conferences

Scottish Renewables was represented at SNP and Scottish Green Party conferences and attended fringe events hosted by Heriot-Watt University, Stop Climate Chaos and the CBI. Head of Policy Michael Rieley also participated in a fringe debate hosted by EDF Energy alongside a panel including Paul Wheelhouse MSP, Minister for Business, Innovation and Energy.

### Westminster Reception

A reception in the Palace of Westminster, organised by Scottish Renewables, was attended by dozens of members as well as around 30 MPs and Lords from each of the parties representing Scottish constituencies.

The event was hosted by <u>Alan Brown MP</u>, SNP Spokesperson on Transport, Infrastructure and Energy, and provided an opportunity for member organisations to engage directly with politicians from across the political spectrum.

Scottish Renewables' Chief Executive Claire Mack <u>responded to news that</u> the Scottish Government is to set up a publicly-owned, not-for-profit energy company which will use renewably-generated power.

## Cost of Energy Review

<u>An independent Cost of Energy Review</u>, led by Professor Dieter Helm CBE, was published by BEIS last week.

The review has two main findings:

- The cost of energy is significantly higher than it needs to be to meet government climate change targets and carbon budgets
- Energy policy, regulation and market design are not fit for purpose given the levels of change within the energy system.

## UK Budget Representation

<u>Scottish Renewables representation to HM Treasury</u> on the UK Autumn Budget set out a number of priorities including the continued growth of less established technologies, unlocking investment in the lowest cost forms of energy and providing clarity and support for smaller and community-scale renewables.

## Media reaction - CfD announcement

Scottish Renewables responded to news that the UK Government <u>has confirmed</u> up to £557 million will go to support new renewable energy projects, and that the next Contracts for Difference auction will be held in spring 2019.

### Assessment and Design Fees

BEIS has launched a <u>consultation on allowing distribution network operators (DNOs)</u> <u>to charge upfront Assessment & Design (A&D) fees</u> when processing distribution network connection requests.

This proposal is designed to help ensure a fairer sharing of costs between customers and help improve the efficiency of the overall connection process.

## **TNUoS forecasts**

National Grid has today published its TNUoS forecasts.

These take into account changes introduced through CMP 264/265 (embedded benefit) and CMP 268 and result in tariff changes.

### Ofgem storage consultations

Ofgem has launched two consultations on energy storage, with deadlines of November 27:

- 1. Clarifying the regulatory framework for electricity storage: Licensing
- 2. <u>Enabling the competitive deployment of storage in a flexible energy system:</u> <u>Changes to the electricity distribution license</u>.

These consultations could have far-reaching implications for how storage can be deployed on the network. Please send any views to <u>Hannah Smith</u>.

## Network Charging Update

Ofgem has established a <u>Charging Futures Forum</u> to consider charging issues. Scottish Renewables has a seat on that group.

A Charging Delivery Body has been set up to support the aims of the CFF – and in particular to ensure developments are well communicated – and two Task Forces on network access are also being established.
