Dear Member,

The Scottish Government held a meeting last month to discuss its Fees Charged for Applications under the Electricity Act 1989 consultation. The proposals outline considerable fee increases at a time when the industry is looking towards cost reduction, as supported by the Scottish Government's Energy Strategy.



We heard members express concern over transparency around the proposals, as well as the viability of future projects in the face of steep cost increases.

Consultation response: RIIO-2 Framework

RIIO (Revenues = Incentives + Innovation + Outputs) is Ofgem's approach to ensuring the monopoly companies who run gas and electricity networks have enough revenue to run an efficient network that delivers what customers need.

The current price control period is due to finish in 2021, and <u>Scottish Renewables has responded</u> to Ofgem's consultation framework for the next price control period, RIIO-2.

Our response highlights that the price control should be aligned to clean energy objectives, enable Scottish Networks to support new volumes of capacity and enable network innovation.

Later on the same day SR Director of Communications Nick Sharpe asked the Secretary of State about the future of the Feed-in Tariff, as well as raising issues caused by uncertainty around the RHI and CfD mechanisms.

It is now understood that clarity will be provided by BEIS in its response to Prof Dieter Helm's Cost of Energy Review, which is expected sometime in spring.

This <u>consultation</u> seeks views on an amendment to the Renewables Obligation (Scotland) Order 2009 to enable hydroelectric generating stations in Scotland to increase their declared net capacity above 20MW.
