## Scottish National Investment Bank: where next?

The Scottish Government has published an analysis of responses to a consultation which was recently held on the Scottish National Investment Bank.

Its conclusions are explained in this blog by <u>Finance Secretary</u> <u>Derek McKay</u>.

Hannah Smith, Senior Policy Manager at Scottish Renewables, <u>said</u>: "Accessing the right type of finance is one of the key challenges faced by renewable energy developers, so it is important that the economics of the transition to a cleaner energy system are reflected here."



#### **Smart Export Guarantee**

Scottish Renewables has <u>developed a response</u> to BEIS' Smart Export Guarantee consultation. The proposals centre around obligating suppliers to offer an export guarantee, which BEIS see as driving forward the transition to a smart energy system. While our response discusses some benefits of the scheme (such as encouraging half hourly metering) we express a number of concerns - most fundamentally that the mechanism will do little for small-scale renewable generators.

#### SR pushes for Orkney reinforcement

While we have welcomed Ofgem's minded to decision to approve the Final Needs Case for the Orkney transmission project, <u>we have responded to Ofgem</u> setting out our concerns with conditionality criteria set out - particularly Ofgem's minimum generation threshold.

#### RIIO-2

Ofgem is <u>consulting</u> on the methodology it will apply for setting the RIIO-2 price controls for the gas and electricity transmission networks and the electricity system operator. The deadline for this consultation is March 14.

#### Change of date: SR Heat Forum

Our next heat forum, due to take place on March 22, has been rescheduled as we are await a number of Scottish Government consultations that have been delayed.

#### New CCC report on decarbonising housing

The Committee on Climate Change <u>has published a new</u> <u>report</u> looking at the policies required to make new build and existing UK homes fit for climate mitigation and adaptation.

A key recommendation of the report is that all new homes should cease to be connected to the gas grid from 2025.

#### LHEES Guidance on Socio-economic Assessments

The Scottish Government has published two sets of guidance documents setting out how Local Authorities should conduct <u>plan</u> and <u>project</u> level socio-economic assessments as part of their Local Heat and Energy Efficiency Strategies.

These assessments are intended to inform the designation of zones in an LHEES (e.g. for district heating) as well as the evaluation of specific project proposals.

The Scottish Government announced last month that it would support tidal energy through a new challenge fund.

Responding, Hannah Smith, Senior Policy Manager at Scottish Renewables, said: "This new fund will help tidal energy developers innovate and lower costs – crucial when many are deploying devices which can already reliably produce electricity, but which are locked out of the energy market because they must compete with technologies like offshore wind, which has secured support to deploy at scale and deliver staggering cost reductions."
