This issue of Scottish Renewables' Monthly Briefing showcases our responses to The Scottish Government's recent consultation on the draft Energy Strategy and accompanying documents, including the Onshore Wind Policy Statement and Scotland's Energy Efficiency Programme.

There's a huge amount to welcome in the draft Strategy, particularly the Scottish Government's vision and ambitions for our future energy system. However delivering those ambitions requires monumental changes in the way we generate and consume energy, and it's not clear how this will be achieved.



We understand the plan is to publish the final Energy Strategy early next year, so we strongly encourage members to continue to engage with the Scottish Renewables team on these issues as the final document takes shape.

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General

Business Rates

The 2017 Business Rates Revaluation came into force on 1 April.

The lodging of competent appeals against the rating assessments MUST be completed by 30 September 2017. While there are <u>appeal rights</u> after that date, they are significantly reduced.

We recommend all members take the advice of professional rating experts before lodging appeals.

Energy Strategy Consultation Response

Scottish Renewables has submitted its <u>consultation response</u> to the Scottish Government's draft Energy Strategy and also issued <u>a press release</u> on that response, as well as <u>addressing a meeting of the Scottish Parliament's Economy</u>, <u>Jobs and Fair Work Committee</u>.

The response recommends the strategy:

- Develops clear action plans to outline the practical steps which will deliver the Strategy's targets and vision
- Outlines the critical decision points that will play a role in determining the future of Scotland's energy supply
- Ensures all devolved policy levers are maximised to deliver the scale of transformation in energy supply required by the Strategy

SEEP consultation

<u>Scottish Renewables' response</u> to the consultation on Scotland's Energy Efficiency Programme (SEEP) is now available on our website.

We welcome the aims of SEEP to reduce energy demand and decarbonise the heat supply of Scotland's built environment but have concerns with the trajectory of the emission reduction pathways set out in the draft Climate Change Plan, which SEEP has adopted as its objectives.

Onshore Wind Policy Statement consultation response

Scottish Renewables has submitted its <u>response</u> to the Scottish Government's consultation on the draft Onshore Wind Policy Statement.

The response recommends the Policy Statement ensures all devolved policy levers

are being fully utilised; encourages the consideration of the latest turbine technologies; commits to preparing guidance on repowering and ensures a flexible and inclusive approach to shared ownership is followed.

Offshore Renewables

<u>Judicial Review of the Forth and Tay wind farms consent – appeal</u> decision

The <u>decision on the Scottish Minister's appeal to the Inner House of the Court of Session</u> was announced on 16 May.

Lord Carloway found in favour of the Scottish Ministers and the interested parties (Inch Cape, Seagreen Alpha and Bravo and Neart Na Gaoithe) on all grounds of appeal.

A further appeal to this latest decision could still be lodged.

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
