May saw the Scottish Government act on advice from the Committee on Climate Change and commit to net-zero carbon emissions by 2045 – turning up the dial on Scotland's efforts to tackle emissions ahead of the rest of the UK.

The announcement, made by Environment Secretary Roseanna Cunningham, opens up the opportunity for significant changes to the policy environment in which renewable energy operates.

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Scotland's green energy export impact revealed

A new Scottish Renewables <u>study</u> used input from members to reveal the reach of Scotland's renewable energy industry. We found home-grown renewable energy expertise is being put to work in 72 countries, with Scottish businesses employing staff in 22 of those.

Media coverage was achieved in the Daily Mail, Herald and Scotsman, while CEO Claire Mack presented the findings in a session at All-Energy.



Scottish Renewables at the Scottish Parliament

Our new Director of Policy Morag Watson represented the industry before the Environment, Climate Change and Land Reform Committee of the Scottish Parliament in a roundtable evidence session on Stage 2 of the Climate Change (Emissions Reduction Targets) Bill.

She confirmed SR's support for the net-zero target and made clear that the technology exists, and that SR members are ready to deliver a green energy revolution in Scotland - but that government must play it part by establishing a stable and supportive policy environment for renewable energy.

The Scottish Government is <u>seeking evidence</u> on the technologies and policies required to decarbonise buildings not connected to the gas grid.

Consultation: Energy Efficient Scotland

The Scottish Government is <u>consulting</u> on the design of the Energy Efficient Scotland programme, seeking views on accelerating the speed at which the programme delivers and the role of low-carbon heat (including what more could be done to support the roll out of heat networks).

SNH Repowering Guidance

Scottish Parliament Debate on the Offshore Wind Supply Chain

The Scottish Labour Party led a debate on the Scottish offshore wind supply chain, with a particular focus on BiFab. SR provided MSPs with a comprehensive briefing ahead of the debate, however all parties in Parliament supported the campaign to secure work for the Fife yard and the politicians were critical of the industry's approach to Scottish and UK content in offshore wind farms.
