Scottish Renewables sparks discussion in Parliament

In our role as secretariat of the Scottish Parliament's crossparty group (CPG) on renewable energy and energy efficiency, Scottish Renewables this month arranged a joint meeting with the CPG for oil and gas to discuss the energy transition.

Chaired by Aberdeenshire West MSP Alexander Burnett, the event was an immediate success - with parliamentarians, business representatives and academics amongst the nearly 70 attendees. UK Budget 2020/21

Scottish Renewables continues its programme of engagement with the UK Government, setting out our members' priorities for the upcoming UK budget, expected in early March. Our key asks are set out in a <u>letter to the Chancellor of the Exchequer</u>, <u>Sajid Javid</u>, which builds on our work during the recent General Election.

Our key asks, which mirror those made in our <u>General</u> <u>Election Manifesto</u>, would, among other things, help the recently-elected Government meet its manifesto commitments, including to deliver two million new jobs in clean energy over the next decade.

Scottish Budget 2020/21

"February 6 will mark Derek Mackay's fourth budget as Scotland's Finance Secretary, but it may very well prove to be his most important".

Media reaction: Infrastructure Commission for Scotland report

The Infrastructure Commission for Scotland released a new 'Key Findings Report – A blueprint for Scotland' which outlines a 30-year infrastructure strategy with an emphasis on delivering an inclusive, net-zero carbon economy.

Responding, Morag Watson, Director of Policy at Scottish Renewables, said: "Scottish Renewables was pleased to contribute to the work of the Commission in developing this report and we welcome its emphasis on achieving net-zero, as well as its recognition of the key role of the renewable energy industry."

OFFSHORE RENEWABLES

Scottish Government Offshore Wind Supply Chain Summit

The Scottish Government's second supply chain summit was held on January 16. SR attended after providing a briefing to the Government beforehand, setting out industry's actions to date.

Delegates were <u>told</u> that developers will have to agree on supply-chain commitments when applying for the upcoming ScotWind Leasing round. <u>Responding</u>, Claire Mack, Chief Executive of Scottish Renewables, said: "Any measures which may reduce the competitiveness of Scotland's offshore wind sector must be carefully considered."

Offshore Wind Conference

Scottish Renewables' sold-out Offshore Wind Conference, Exhibition & Dinner, held in association with ORE Catapult, took place on January 28-29 in Glasgow. The conference saw a 23% increase in delegate numbers from last year, with 300 people attending both days. Outcome of the Tretton Review

The conclusions of the <u>Tretton Review</u> were published in January following a two-year inquiry. The report sets out the options to be considered by Scottish Ministers and suggests that government reliefs for small-scale hydro should continue, rather than implementing proposed legislative changes put forward by industry representatives. <u>Read how we reacted to</u> <u>media here</u>.

Future of the Renewable Heat Incentive

The Scottish Parliament's Economy, Energy and Fair Work Committee <u>has written to the UK Government</u> requesting clarity regarding the future of the Renewable Heat Incentive (RHI) after the issue was raised at an evidence session attended by Scottish Renewables. Separately, the Prime Minister confirmed that the UK Government is looking at 'successor schemes' <u>when asked about the scheme in</u> <u>Parliament</u> last month.

Heat Decarbonisation Programme

SR attended the Scottish Government's heat decarbonisation stakeholder group, where plans for an expanded programme of policy development were discussed.

As well as assessing the current evidence base officials will be exploring on-gas and off-gas policies, a net-zero carbon standard for new public buildings, the heat networks policy framework and long-term financing and market structures.

Committee on Climate Change rates Scotland's progress

The Committee on Climate Change has <u>published its annual</u> <u>evaluation</u> of Scotland's progress in cutting climate emissions. Emissions fell 3% in 2017, compared to a 10% reduction in 2016, reflecting Scotland's first full coal-free year of power generation.

While the Committee welcomes Scotland's recent progress and new ambition to reach net-zero emissions by 2045, it warns that this will not be achieved without steps to reduce emissions immediately.

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
