After one of the most complex policy development processes in recent years, Scottish Renewables submitted its <u>Position</u> <u>Statement on NPF4</u> to The Scottish Government's <u>Call for</u> <u>Ideas</u>, along with five supplementary position papers in key areas including wild land, peat and landscape capacity sensitivity studies.



The Scottish Government has now published independent <u>Analysis on Responses to the Call for Ideas</u> and an <u>Executive</u> <u>Summary</u>, which largely reflects industry's position.

We have also been working hard on the presumption in favour of sustainability issue, and were pleased to see action from Government on this following concerned efforts across policy, public affairs and media. You can read more in the Planning & Consents section of this email.

Programme for Government 2020-21

Over the past four months we've been working with politicians from all parties to advocate for a green recovery and for The Scottish Government to introduce a <u>Renewable Transition</u> <u>Training Fund</u>.

Advocacy work included research carried out for SR - and highlighted in <u>this press release</u> - which showed eight in ten Scots oil workers have considered that their careers could be impacted by actions being taken to tackle climate change, and that more than three-quarters are positive about retraining to join the renewable energy industry.

We were delighted to see this policy influence key announcements in the First Minister's Programme for Government 2020-21 of a £100 million Green Jobs Fund and a £25 million National Transition Training Fund. We reacted with this comment.

Meeting with Paul Wheelhouse, Minister for Energy, Connectivity and the Islands

Claire Mack met with Paul Wheelhouse, Minister for Energy, Connectivity and the Islands, to discuss what actions The Scottish Government can undertake to deliver a green recovery.

The proposal to remove the presumption of sustainable development from Scottish Planning Policy as a retrograde step for renewables and government ambitions was discussed in detail, and the Minister will act on behalf of our industry to address this.


We also highlighted the need to speed up consenting, the Heat Networks Bill and the need to build green skills.

We were pleased to be able to announce at our Member Forum on September 3 that the proportion of female speakers at SR events in 2019/20 rose 5.5%, to 37.5%. Work continues to increase this figure further.

Annual Conference 2020

SR's <u>Annual Conference</u>, delayed from spring because of the coronavirus pandemic, was held virtually from September 1-3, attended by more than 170 registered delegates. Action from SR: removal of presumption in favour of sustainable development

SR has been working hard on behalf of its members in recent weeks following the publication of The Scottish Government's <u>Scottish Planning Policy and Housing: Technical Consultation</u> <u>on Proposed Policy Amendments</u>. The consultation's proposal to remove the presumption in favour of sustainable development in SPP has implications for all types of development, including renewable energy.

Following a series of meetings on this issue - with Energy Minister Paul Wheelhouse MSP; opposition MSPs; Kersti Berge, Director of Energy and Climate Change at The Scottish Government and The Scottish Government's Chief Planner we were pleased to see <u>a letter issued by the Chief Planner</u> which clarified the immediate situation. It said:

"I would ... like to make it clear to all authorities that none of the changes proposed in the consultation aim to undermine or contradict Ministers' stated commitments to delivering good quality development, including housing and renewable energy projects."

We have also written to Planning Minister Kevin Stewart MSP and issued <u>this press release</u>, in which Morag Watson says: "Removing the presumption in favour of sustainable development ... will present serious issues to the development of the energy projects which we need to provide clean power, transport and heat as we progress towards a 2045 net-zero target."

Scottish Renewables has prepared a <u>draft response</u> to the consultation, and would urge all interested members to use our final version (which will be communicated to our Planning and Consents Forum - <u>join here</u>) as the basis of their own response.

The Scottish Government has issued a <u>consultation paper</u> on its 'Proposed Changes to Pre-Application Consultation Requirements in Planning'.

These changes are not related to COVID-19, but follow on from the review of Planning, the report 'Empowering Planning to Deliver Great Places', SG's 'Places, People and Planning' consultations and new powers in section 18 of the Planning (Scotland) Act 2019. Independent Analysis on NPF4 Call for Ideas

The independent <u>Analysis on Responses to the Call for Ideas</u> and <u>Executive Summary</u> of The Scottish Government's NPF4 Call for Ideas are now complete and available to view. Business rates 2022 revaluation delayed

The Scottish Government has <u>announced</u> that the next business rates revaluation will be delayed by one year. The revaluation will now take effect on April 1, 2023, and will be based on rental values as at April 1, 2022, delivering on the Barclay Review's recommendation to move to a one-year tone date two years ahead of schedule. This move is intended to ensure rateable values better reflect market conditions and take into account any COVID-19 effects.

Extension to business rates appeal period

Given the impact COVID-19 has had on progressing the business rates appeal resolution process, the statutory deadline for disposing of appeals has been extended by one year to December 31, 2021. BEIS publishes Electricity Generation Cost report

BEIS has published its <u>Electricity Generation Cost report</u> for 2020. The report, which provides estimates of the levelised costs for different electricity generation technologies, shows the tumbling costs of renewable generation compared to the previous report, which was <u>published in 2016</u>.
